Presentation: Mary Etter, Executive Director of the Bristol Adult Resources Center

Topic: Services at the Bristol Adult Resource Center

Mary Etter introduced herself and spoke on some background information regarding the Bristol Adult Resource Center (BARC). BARC was originally founded in 1957 and concentrates on providing services to those with developmental disabilities.

BARC recently moved some of its operations to 225 North Main Street (fifth floor). The move was funded with American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds.

BARC was Bristol's largest recipient of ARPA funds with about \$1.5 million. The new location will include an expansion of the existing Hidden Café to offer food options. This is in addition to the location BARC has on Jerome Avenue.

BARC provides a variety of services to assist those with disabilities including providing assistance with employment and other training. Part of the expansion includes new training and services. There is a stronger focus on working with those with autism including a new sensory room at the North Main Street location. The current sensory room at BARC's Lake Avenue location will remain in operation.

BARC supports about 140 individuals. BARC focuses their support on adults of all ages beginning around 21 years of age usually out of high school and includes the elderly.

BARC also supports group homes. Currently, BARC oversees 12 group homes that are operated in several different arrangements including direct ownership and rental agreements. Ms. Etter stated that two more houses are slated to be added by donations from landlords.

BARC is currently planning a fundraising event which is scheduled to take place at the DoubleTree on May 16. Ticket prices are \$85 each.

Ms. Etter expressed concern over the uncertainty over federal funding. BARC receives half of its funds from the state and the other half from the federal government. There would be problems if Medicaid payments were stopped. There is also concern about the proposed disestablishment of the United States Department of Education.

Throughout the presentation, Ms. Etter answered questions and reacted to comments from commissioners and members of the audience.

New/Current Business

- * At the time of the meeting, no speakers had been confirmed for any future meetings.

- *Due to the absence of Commissioner Bajurny, there were no updates regarding the installation of the smoke/CO detectors.

- *Chairman Micari stated that he is waiting on updates regarding the establishment of the state Bureau for Deaf, Deafblind and Hard of Hearing Services. Regarding this, Deb Reed stated that there have been delays in hiring people. They are needed to assist blind children, teachers, etc.

Old Business

- *Jon Sahlin, ASL interpreter, led the Commission in teaching ASL signs related to

Valentine's Day.
